Oakwood Primary Academy Homework Policy

Rationale

Reading at home an essential part of a good education and this is the basis for all regular home learning at Oakwood. Homework is important because it gives children the opportunity to practise at home the tasks done in class and helps them work towards improving important skills. It also encourages children to become confident and independent in their learning, which will help throughout their time at school and later in adult life. Homework activities are an important part of the home/school partnership. All children are expected to take part in a variety of homework tasks to enhance and support their work in class.

Aims

Through this policy we aim to:

- Provide opportunities for parents, children and the school to work together in partnership in relation to children's learning.
- Create a positive and meaningful communication between home and school.
- Encourage children and their parents to share and enjoy reading and learning experiences.
- Encourage children to take responsibility for their own learning.
- Ensure consistency of approach throughout the school.
- To practise or consolidate basic skills and knowledge, especially in Reading English and Mathematics.
- Reinforce work covered in class by providing further opportunities for individual learning.

Homework expectations

- The nature and type of homework changes throughout a child's school career.
- The amount and frequency of homework should increase as a child gets older.
- Homework should not cause undue stress on the child, family or the teacher.
- It will not necessarily come in the form of a written task.
- Homework should be set regularly from the Foundation Stage to Year 6.

The responsibilities of the child:

- To look after your homework book or folder and reading book.
- To complete tasks to the best of your ability.
- To plan ahead.
- To take responsibility for as much of your homework as you can.
- To take pride in the presentation and content of your work.
- To ask your teacher for help if you do not understand the homework task you have been given.

The responsibilities of the school:

- To set up regular homework in a consistent and easily followed routine.
- To inform parents of the homework routine at the start of each year.
- To set appropriate homework.
- To acknowledge that homework has been seen by the class teacher. (This will take the form of initials or a marking stamp.)

- To ensure children have a clear understanding of the tasks involved.
- To ensure any homework is purposeful and links directly to the curriculum being taught.
- To reward and praise children who regularly complete homework tasks.

The responsibilities of the parent:

- To sign a home-school agreement related to homework.
- To take a keen interest and encourage a positive attitude to reading and homework.
- To provide somewhere quiet for children to work without the distractions of mobiles, television and other family members.
- To support the school in explaining to children that homework is valued and aids learning.
- To encourage your child read regularly and to hand in homework on time.
- To help your child where necessary.
- To let the class teacher know if your child has had difficulties completing tasks.

Inclusion and Equality

At Oakwood Primary Academy we welcome all children. Where a child has a recognised disability, we will make all reasonable adjustments to accommodate their needs in school. This will include the availability of resources and accessibility of the school building and site. We will make every effort to ensure that children with Special Educational Needs maintain their entitlement when they enter the school.

We are committed to ensuring equality of education and opportunity for all children; irrespective of race, gender, disability, religion and belief, or socio-economic background. We aim to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity in which all those connected to the school feel proud of their identity and are able to participate fully in school life.

General

- If a child is absent due to illness, we will not send homework home. We would assume the child was too ill to work.
- An arrangement with a parent and the teacher can be agreed regarding homework if
 a child is off school for a significant period of time due to an extended illness,
 hospitalisation or self-isolating if following advice from NHS Test and Trace.
- Parents/Carers who have queries about homework should not hesitate to make an appointment to see their child's class teacher.

Homework Tasks and Time Allocation

Year Group	Time allocation	Home Learning Set
Foundation	10 minutes per night	Reading - share a book or read together at home with your child daily. Reading books will be sent home when your child is ready to progress to home-school reading books. This will be after they have completed the initial stages of the Read Write Inc programme. Library books (after half term) — changed in school at least once a week to share with your child at home. Home learning - set weekly in a Busy Book (after half term).
Year I and 2	I hour per week	Reading - daily and reading diary to be signed at home. Spellings - set weekly (YI after ½ term) Read Write Inc - phonic learning tasks
Year 3 and 4	I and ½ hours per week	Reading – reading diary to be signed at home and brought to school the next day. Spellings/handwriting - set weekly Multiplication Tables – Times Table Rock Stars (TTRS)
Year 5 and 6	30 minutes per night (5 nights)	Reading – 15 minutes daily and reading diary to be signed at home and brought to school the next day. Spellings - set weekly Multiplication Tables - Times Table Rock Stars (TTRS)

Homework is set on a Friday to be returned the following Thursday.

Tips for parents and carers

Research tells us that the main distraction for children when completing homework is television or engaging in social media. We would advise children to work in a room away from the television if possible. This also applies to other devices such as mobile phones, tablets or games consoles.

Try to encourage your child to:

- Take responsibility for their homework and plan ahead.
- Organise a weekly routine for doing homework, as they may have other commitments during the week which will take up a lot of their time.
- · Avoid leaving it until the last minute.
- To read and to do homework regularly.

As a parent try to:

- Be positive about reading and homework and have clear rules.
- Praise and encourage as work is being done.
- Supervise but from a distance to encourage independence.
- Please take time to check that the work is properly completed and **neatly presented.**
