Plymouth Junior Life Skills 2019

On Friday 7th June our year 6 students attended the 'Junior Life Skills' event which is designed to promote personal and community safety. The morning took place at the Naval Depot at Bullpoint and the children experienced range of practical and а interactive activities that raised awareness about safety in areas such as: fire, water, electrical, railways, buses and even a short session on CPR!





The children really enjoyed the activities, they found the City Bus introduction incredibly helpful, several children commented how they now feel more confident about catching the bus to their secondary schools when they start in year 7. They also enjoyed watching the chip fat explosion and are now all aware that they should not pour water onto burning fat!

All year 6 children were given a free weeks bus pass to use on City Bus and Devon & Somerset Fire and Rescue Service made the children aware that all households are entitled to a free home safety check. All you have to do is call them and book, they will even replace any faulty extension leads free of charge!

STEM Pylon Challenge



As part of our DT and STEM links Langage Power Station visited Maple and Chestnut Class to deliver a Pylon Challenge workshop. The children were put into groups and given a brief on the expectations of their pylons. They then had to design and build their Pylons using K'Nex. Some of the designs were incredible and the children presented them giving some great feedback on why they chose their design. There was some



super scientific and engineering vocabulary used. Both classes focused really well and showed some great initiative and team work. All the children received a Langage gift bag for their efforts.

After the tour the children returned to the Discovery Centre and participated in a series of activities related to energy production and conservation. They even got to produce their own electricity!
