

Reading Corner 2

Look out for reading tips, advice on book selection and some favourite reads from the staff and children at Oakwood.

When you read a book with your child, the discussion about the story can help to develop his/her reading comprehension skills. Together you can explore and question events and characters in the story. Here are a few ideas to get you started!

Foundation or Key Stage 1 **During reading:**

What is happening in the pictures? What has happened so far? Is it what you expected to happen? What might happen next? How do you think the story might end? What sort of character

Is he/she friendly/ unkind/ nice...?

Key Stage 2 During reading:

What has happened so far? Is it what you expected to happen? What clues in the story made you think that? What might happen next? Why do you think that?

How do you think the story might end? Who is your favourite character? Why? Who is the character you like least? Why? Find 2 sentences, which describe the setting...


